Scott Cochran, Strength Coach, Univ. of Alabama

Strength and conditioning coach at the University of Alabama, nationally known for his enthusiasm and willingness to be on the field with the players always. Cochran's offseason program is known as the 4th quarter program, one of his claims to fame. The goal is to finish the game, finish the season. Much of the mental and physical toughness is born at his hands and through the mouth of Scott Cochran during the offseason at the University of Alabama, he's responsible for the development of the recruits coming out of high school. Many of the players that have played at Alabama owe their careers to his development in the weight room. Cochran embodies Nick Sabin's mantra of excellence; he encourages the players constantly in all aspects of the game: he leads the weight room work, walks through the stretching, cheers for them during the games and hugs them at graduation. He develops all players from their conditioning to performance to mental toughness to academics.

Anthony Scelfo, QB Coach, Northwestern State Univ.

Scelfo came to Natchitoches after a two-year stint at Texas-San Antonio where he coached quarterbacks and tight ends as a graduate assistant. In both of Scelfo's seasons at UTSA, the Roadrunners surpassed 2,000 passing yards, topping out at 2,777 in the 2016 season. During his playing career, Scelfo was a three-year football letterman (2005-07). At Tulane, Scelfo passed for 1,396 yards and six touchdowns while chipping in 171 rushing yards. While a senior at New Orleans' Jesuit High School, Scelfo became the first player in the past 50 years to be named the Catholic League's Most Valuable Player in both football and baseball and was an all-state selection in both sports.

Frank Scelfo, HFC, Southeastern Louisiana Univ.

Frank Scelfo is currently the head coach at Southeastern Louisiana University. Scelfo was the offensive coordinator for the UTSA Roadrunners football team of the University of Texas at San Antonio from 2016 to 2017. Scelfo has also served as the quarterbacks coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars of the National Football League. He played college baseball at Northeast Louisiana. A native of Abbeville, Scelfo spent 14 seasons in the state coaching at Louisiana Tech and Tulane. Most recently Scelfo spent the previous two seasons as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at UTSA under Frank Wilson. Scelfo brings over 30 years of football knowledge to our clinic, including NFL experience. He spent three seasons in the NFL with the Jacksonville Jaguars as an offensive assistant working closely with Blake Bortles. He also spent time with the Arizona Cardinals in 2010 and 2011.

Karl Scott, Cornerback Coach, Univ. of Alabama

Scott's coaching career began at Delta State as a graduate assistant in 2007 where he coached with Pete Golding. He joined the Tide Staff in December 2017. Coach Scott also coached at Southeastern Louisiana State in 2012-13. A native of Houston, Scott played at McMurray University in Abilene, Texas. Scott spent the previous two seasons as a secondary coach at Texas Tech before being named the Defensive Coordinator at Louisiana Lafayette. Coaching the secondary at Texas Tech in 2017 his unit posted an impressive turn around helping produce 29 turnovers and 14 interceptions. He mentored two all Big 12 selections. The Alabama secondary is rated as one of the best in the country and has helped the defense become one of the best in the nation.

Clint Trickett, TE & QB Coach, FL Intn. Univ.

Trickett committed to Florida State University to play college football in September 2009. He transferred to the WVU in May 2013. In his first season at West Virginia, Trickett played in eight games with seven starts. As a senior in 2014 Trickett was named the starter for the season. He started 11 games, completing 281 of 419 passes for 3,285 yards with 18 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. In December, Trickett announced he was retiring from football after sustaining five concussions in 14 months. Trickett started his coaching career in 2015 as the quarterbacks coach at East Mississippi Community College (EMCC) in Scooba, Mississippi, one of the most successful JUCO programs in the country in recent years. He was featured prominently in the Netflix series Last Chance U, which chronicled EMCC's 2015 and 2016 seasons. In early 2017, Trickett accepted the position of tight ends coach at Florida Atlantic under Lane Kiffin.

Sam Williams, HFC, Pelahatchie HS, MS

One of the Best young coaches in Mississippi, Williams started learning his coaching skills while playing at Mississippi State from 2009-11. Primarily as a WR and Special teams while at MSU. After graduation he served as an assistant coach at NW Rankin before returning to Starkville to coach there for one year while getting his Master's degree at MSU. Later he went back to NW Rankin as an assistant coach before accepting the HFC job at Pelahatchie. In his first two seasons he has guided the Chiefs to 11-2 and 10-3 Seasons. Coach Williams is married and he and his wife, Rachel, have 3 children.

Steve Mask, HFC St. Paul's High School, Mobile, AL

Steve began his coaching career at Colbert County High school in 1990 as an assistant coach. His first head coaching job was at Colbert County where in two seasons the Indians won a region championship and appeared in the state tournament. He then went to Bradshaw in 1990 where he remained for five seasons. Three of his teams made the playoffs and the Bruins won a region title game, the first in school history. In 1997 he took over the head coaching duties at Buck Buckhorn High School for another 5 seasons his team won a school best nine games 2002. He then went to Colbert County but this time as the head coach and in five seasons his teams went 42 and 15, winning 4 region championships and qualifying for the playoffs each season. His first team reached the 3A championship game before losing to TR Miller. At Saint Paul's in Mobile before taking over the head coaching duties in 2012, they completed a perfect 15-0 season in 2014 capping the year with a class 5A state championship. His 2015 team followed by finishing 13- 2 and won a second consecutive championship. His overall coaching record stands at 179-90 record with 6 region crowns, 16 playoff appearances in 22 seasons.

Reese Dismukes, Youth Coach, OL Coach

At Spanish Fort High School Dismukes twice earned Allstate recognition as an offensive lineman and he received the class 5A lineman of the year award in 2010 when he was a Parade and Under Armor All-American at Auburn. Dismukes started for Four Seasons capping his collegiate career as a consensus All-American and the winner of the Remington Trophy and known as the nation's best center. In 2014, Spanish Fort won the Alabama high school Athletic Association class 5A football championship during Dismukes senior season after posting a 4-16 record in its first two seasons. Spanish Fort has gone on to a record 10 wins 17 losses and 3 state championships in the past 9 years starting with Dismukes sophomore season.

Anthony Hart, HFC, Madison Central HS, MS

Hart took over the Jaguar program in 2016 following the departure of Brad Peterson to the MSU staff. He has had to fill the shoes of the previous two coaches that include the well known and very successful Bobby Hall. Hart is known around the state for his 9 years at Lafayette hems. The Commodores lost the 2009 state championship and then won the next two years which include 32 games in a row and were the top team in the state regardless of classification. He was head coach for 7 of the 9 years he spent at Lafayette as the head coach they compiled a 90-19 record with three region championships. They won two state championships during the Dores' win streak. Overall Hart has been a head coach for 17 Season including stops at his alma mater Lloyd and West Lauderdale. His teams went to the postseason 15 times.

Brent Dougherty, DC, UMS-Wright Jr. High, AL

Coach Dougherty is a graduate of UMS-Wright Prep in Mobile, Alabama. He played for legendary Coach Terry Curtis which is always one of the top programs in the state. He attended Lee University before returning to UMS-Wright to teach before becoming a principal for 10 years. He is known as one of the best Jr. Hi. (Middle School) coaches in the Mobile area. He has developed the players that go on to be coached in one of the best schools in the State. His organizational skills and ability to teach football to young players is credited to be one of the reasons that the Bulldogs are annually in the State Play-offs.

Gabe Fertitta, HFC Baton Rouge Catholic HS

One of the Top coaches in Louisiana. Fertitta started his coaching career in a historic way. He became the 2013 Sun Herald coach of the year he took St. Stanislaus from an 0-9 team in 2012 to 10-0 regular season in 2013. In 2015 he was offensive coordinator for Division 1 state champion Catholic High. In 2017 he became the head coach and since then became 5A Division 1 State Champions in 2017. In 2018 he became the 5A coach of the year and also in 2018 he was the 5-A District Champions and the Division One state runner up for Louisiana.

Jack Wright, HFC Miss Gulf Coast CC

Jack Wright is the head coach at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, where he has a higher winning percentage than any coach in school history two years into his job there. The Bulldogs won their first MACJC South title since 2015 last year, finishing the regular season undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the country. He won a national championship at Northwest Mississippi Community College in 2015, just two years into that job after taking over a 1-8 program mired in probation. He has established a reputation as a quarterback whisperer, having mentored Gardner Minshew there before he finished fifth in the Heisman voting and became a rookie wunderkind in the NFL. Wright was also offensive line coach at USM, and has coached at Millsaps College and three Mississippi high schools.
