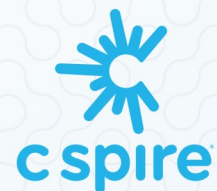

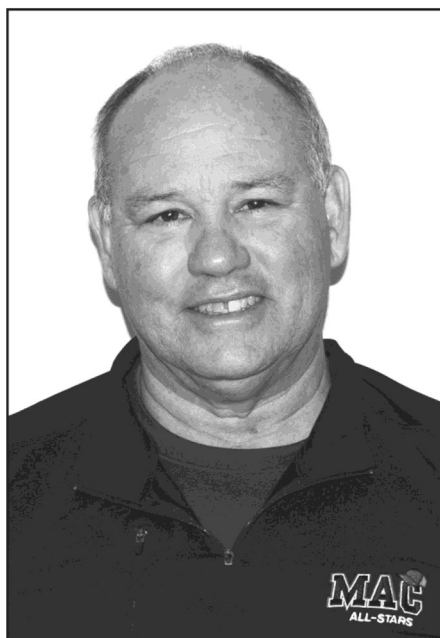

VOLLEYBALL HISTORY

- 2005** The MAC hosted the 1st annual All-Star Volleyball game between the East and West. The game was played at Madison Central High School. The Best Offensive Player was Lialah Putnam of Olive Branch High School. The Best Defensive Player was Lauren Miller of Southaven. In the 1st all-star volleyball match, the squads were divided into an East-West format with the East defeating the West 3 games to 1 in a best of 5 series.
- 2006** The 2nd annual All-Star Volleyball game was moved to A.E. Wood Coliseum, on the campus of Mississippi College, in Clinton, MS. Winning the Best Offensive Player was Brittany Wright of Madison Central and the Best Defensive Player was Alex Cox of Desoto Central. The match was changed to the traditional North-South format in 2006 with the South defeating the North 3-0 by scores of 25-16, 25-21, and 25-16.
- 2007** The 3rd annual All-Star Volleyball game was played in Clinton, MS on the campus of Mississippi College at the A.E. Wood Coliseum. The Best Offensive Player of the game was Mollee Williams of Southern while Mollye Ward of Oak Grove was chosen the Best Defensive Player. The North claimed a 3-0 match victory.
- 2008** The 4th annual All-Star Volleyball game was played at A.E. Wood Coliseum on the campus of Mississippi College. Claire Franks of Olive Branch was named the North Most Outstanding player. The South's Most Outstanding Player was Christina Atwood of Vanleave. The North defeated the South 3-1 by scores of 22-25, 25-11, and 25-16.
- 2009** The South evened the overall series at 2-2 with a 2-1 win in the 5th annual match at the A. E. Wood Coliseum at Mississippi College in Clinton. The South won the opener 25-16, dropped the second contest 21-25, and then claimed victory with a 25-18 score in the third and deciding game. Samantha Overbeck of Long Beach served eight straight points in the first game and was named Most Outstanding Player for the South. Danielle Brown of Olive Branch was chosen MVP for the North squad.
- 2010** A change in the All-Star format featured two simultaneous matches played at the 6th annual match at the A. E. Wood Coliseum at Mississippi College. In the games featuring All-Star seniors the North swept the South 25-16, 25-17, and 30-28. In the games featuring All-Star junior players, the South defeated the North 25-17, 22-25, and 25-15. With the split wins, the series remains tied at 3-3 in the current format which switched from East-West to North-South in 2006. In the junior games, Southaven's Tolly Reynolds was selected as the Outstanding Player for the North while Hancock's Victoria Nutting was named the South's Outstanding Player. The game balls for the junior games, which were selected by the team members for the player exhibiting the best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit were the North's Brianna Davis of Lake Cormorant and the South's Presley Owens of Vanleave. In the senior games, game balls by the team were awarded to the North's Sheri Eubanks of Southaven and Vanleave's Dannielle Taft. The North's Outstanding senior player was Center Hill's Ashley Saunders while the South's Outstanding senior player was Kirsty Schmitt of Our Lady Academy.
- 2011** The North overpowered the South in three straight games by scores of 25-16, 25-10, and 25-14 at the A. E. Wood Coliseum on the campus of Mississippi College. With the sweep in the 7th Annual Match, the North claimed a 4-3 overall series lead. Game balls selected by the individual teams were Ashley James of Southaven for the North and Lane Jackson of Vanleave for the South. Sarah Farmer of Tupelo was selected as the North's Outstanding Player while Torie Clark of Long Beach was named the South's Outstanding Player.
- 2012** After dropping the first contest by a score of 25-20, the North mowed down the South in two straight games by scores of 25-18 and 25-14 at the A. E. Wood Coliseum at Mississippi College. With their 2nd straight win, the North added to their series lead by a 5-3 margin. Special games balls were once again awarded by team members for exhibiting best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit with Corinth's Sadie Johnson being selected by the North and Kristen Dillon chosen

by the South. Sam Latza of Lewisburg was named the North's Most Outstanding Player while Breann Hedin of Long Beach was chosen as the South's Most Outstanding Player.

- 2013** The South rallied in the third and deciding set to halt the North's two-match winning streak at the A. E. Wood Coliseum at Mississippi College. After dropping the first set 16-25, the South took the second set 25-17 and then claimed the match with a close 26-24 third set victory. The South's win cut the North's series lead to 5-4. Madison "Maddy" Frazier of Resurrection was the Most Outstanding Player for the South as she delivered numerous and timely kills, blocks, digs, and service aces. The North's Most Outstanding Player was Rae Drewery of Lafayette who racked up several strings of service aces. Game balls were awarded by team members for exhibiting best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit with Lake Cormorant's Jasmine Sparks being honored by the North squad and Vancleave's Alex Scott selected by her South teammates.
- 2014** The South claimed their second match in a row over the North with a convincing three set sweep by scores of 25-14, 25-13, and 27-25 at the Hangar Dome in the Maurice Hall Activities Center on the campus of Millsaps College. The South win tied the series at 5-5 and was fueled by a second set comeback after the North had taken a 10-point lead. The South's Most Outstanding Player was Blake Mohler of Ocean Springs who recorded several service aces along with key blocks and kills for her squad. Allison Terrell of DeSoto Central was named the North's Most Outstanding Player for her play at the net. Southaven's Jordan Veal for the North and Anna Kate Karsten of Oak Grove for the South were awarded game balls as selected by team members for exhibiting best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit.
- 2015** In a thrilling high energy match, the North swept the South 25-19, 25-18, and 25-19 at the Maurice Hall Activities Center Hangar Dome on the campus of Millsaps College. With the wins, the North took over the series lead at 6-5. The turning point of the match happened in the second set as the teams set a back-and-forth pace for a 14-14 score. The North then proceeded to outscore the South 11-4 to close out the 25-18 win as the South held off two set points. The two teams were tied once again in the third set at 14 apiece before the North went on a 11-5 run to complete the sweep. The North's Most Outstanding Player was McRae Clay of Madison Central while the South's Most Outstanding Player was Genin Harkey of St. Joseph Madison. For first time in All-Star history, the game ball presentation was named in honor of veteran coaches Allison Burchyett of Lewisburg and Mike Meyers of Our Lady Academy in recognition of their efforts in creating the MAC All-Star Volleyball annual matches. The Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls are selected by team members for the players exhibiting the best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit. The first ever Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls were awarded to the North's April Reese of Starkville who had 4 blocks and 3 kills and the South's Emily Delancey of Vancleave who served up several aces.
- 2016** For the second year in a row, the North swept the South 25-17, 25-20, and 25-18 at the Maurice Hall Activities Center Hangar Dome on the campus of Millsaps College. The match win padded the overall series lead for the North to 7-5. In the first set, the teams were tied 11-11 until the North made a 6-0 run to power away for the 25-17 win. Key kills by Kapria Manning of Center Hill paced the North. In the second set, the North surged to an early lead, but the South took its first lead of the match at 11-10 on a kill by Breleigh Favre of Oak Grove. The South held the lead until the North tied the contest at 16-16 and then scored 4 out of the next 6 points to regain the advantage and eventually win 25-20. The third and final set was a seesaw battle and tied at 9-9 before the North executed a run of 16-9 rally points. The South managed to score 5 of the final 7 points, but the North closed out the match with a 25-18 final tally. Outstanding Player Awards were presented to the North's Kapria Manning of Center Hill and the South's Breleigh Favre of Oak Grove as they led their respective teams in kills. For the second

year in a row, Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls were selected by team members for the players exhibiting the best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit. The North's Kelsey Glasper of Lewisburg and the South's Rylee Swilley of Hancock received the Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls for the 12th Annual MAC Volleyball Match.

2017 The South overpowered the North 25-16, 25-17, and 25-23 to snap the North's two-match winning streak. The South victory at the Maurice Hall Activities Center Hangar Dome on the campus of Millsaps College cut the North's lead in the series to 7-6. The South roared out to a huge start in the first set to establish the tone of the match by ripping off a quick 8-0 lead. The North scored in several 3-point outbursts, but the South's service game was the deciding factor in capturing the first set 25-16. In the second set, the North scored early for a 3-2 lead, but the South quickly took the next 8 of 9 rally points and cruised to a 25-17 win. In the third set, the North again jumped out to a 7-6 lead, but the South countered to tie the set at 11-11 and 14-14. Tied at 14-all, the South's service game again took charge to push the squad's lead to a 19-15 margin. The North made the rest of the set interesting as the squad narrowed the gap to 24-23 before the South closed out the sweep at 25-23. The South's Most Outstanding Player was Emma Funk of Our Lady Academy whose serves and play at the net kept the North off balance during the match. The North's Most Outstanding Player was Mattie Meine of DeSoto Central who had a strong service match with outstanding play for kills and digs. The third annual Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls were selected by team members for the players exhibiting the best attitude, work ethic and team spirit. Hancock's Destiny Hariel of the South and Warren Central's Sydney Stuart of the North received the coveted Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls.

2018 The North swept the South 25-21, 25-11, and 25-19 to increase their series lead to 8-6 at the Maurice Hall Activities Center Hangar Dome on the campus of Millsaps College. In the first set, the teams were even for most of the early rally points. Tied at 14-14, the North put together a scoring streak with 10 of the next 17 points to take a 25-21 win. In the second set, the North team exploded from the start with a 4-0 lead that expanded to a 12-6 margin. The North then captured points in 13 of the next 16 serves for the 25-11 set and match win. The third set was highly competitive with the South gaining an early advantage. With the score tied at 17-17, however, the North tallied on the next 6 serves to help complete the sweep at 25-19. The South's Most Outstanding Player was Callie Minsheu of Brandon who was a force on the serve and at the net. The North's Most Outstanding Player was Madison Central's Hallie Phelan whose play at the net and the back line led to many of the North's rally points. The South's Madison Smith of Germantown and the North's Logan Parker of Clinton received the fourth annual Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls for players selected by their teammates for exhibiting the best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit.

2019 For the second consecutive year, the North swept the South 25-18, 25-20, and 25-21 at the Maurice Hall Activities Center Hangar Dome on the campus of Millsaps College. The North sweep was the fourth in the last five years and added to the North's series lead at 9-6. In the first set, the squads were tied at 6-6 before the North scored on 6 of the next 8 rally points. After the South made a run, the North then powered out to a 22-14 lead that eventually led to a 25-18 victory. In the second set, the North was paced by 3 service aces by Lexi Graves of Hernando. Tied at 4-4, the aces led to a North scoring spree as the team took a 13-6 advantage. The South's Sydney Salter of Vancleave helped draw her team close, but the North pulled away with 4 straight points for a 23-14 lead and 25-20 win. The third set was even at 8-8 before the North edged out front by a 17-14 score. The South came back with a surge to draw close at 21-20, but the North claimed 4 of the next 5 rally points to complete the sweep at 25-19. The South's Most Outstanding Player was Sydney Salter of Vancleave whose serves and backline play kept the South in the match in all three sets. The North's Most Outstanding Player

was Lake Cormorant's Isabella Beasley who registered several key kills at the net. The fifth annual Burchyett-Meyers Game Balls, as selected by their teammates for exhibiting the best attitude, work ethic, and team spirit, were awarded to the North's Raegan Stafford of DeSoto Central and the South's Kaytie Rutland of Ocean Springs.

- 2020** The North captured a record-setting third match in a row by defeating the South 25-23, 25-20, and dropping the third set to the South by a 25-22 score. The 17th Annual MAC Volleyball All-Star match was played at the Shivers Gymnasium on the campus of Pearl River Community College in Poplarville and featured the North increasing their series lead to 10-6. In the first set, the North raced out to an early 8-2 lead before the South rallied to claim 3 of the next 5 points and draw the set to back-and-forth points. The North, however, surged to a 16-9 lead after an ace by Chloe Steen of Center Hill. The South chipped away to move closer at 22-19, but the North reached set point at 24-20. The South then staved off 3 set points before the North claimed the win by a 25-23 score. In the second set, the North again rattled off a 10-2 early advantage on the strength of the serves of Erin Latham of Lewisburg who managed an ace during the run. The South then scored on 7 of the next 9 rally points to trail 12-9. Service aces by Emma Godfrey of Resurrection and Hannah Burks of Vancleave kept the South in the contest. The North countered by a run of 11 of the next 17 points to take a 23-15 lead. The South added another ace by Hannah Burks, but the North took a 24-17 lead. Once again, the South held off the North on 3 straight match points, but the North prevailed by a 25-20 tally. The South jumped out to a 7-4 lead in the third set and moved ahead 10-5 following an ace by Allison Carpenter of Ocean Springs. The North took the next 8 of 9 points and grabbed the lead at 12-10 on back-to-back aces by Sydney Horel of Germantown. The set was tied at 15-15, 19-19, and then 22-22 before the South closed out the win on three straight points for the 25-22 victory.
